

The Capes HOA Plant List

Welcome to the Capes!

Below are our planting guidelines and the approved plant list. Remember to add compost or potting mix to the soil to help new plants establish in our sandy environment.

Guidelines

All landscaping shall be natural, indigenous vegetation suitable for The Capes. The Landscape Committee must approve all in-ground plantings of a nonindigenous species. Landscaping that appears on this list is pre-approved.

You will notice that there are no shore pines (Pinus contorta) listed on the plant list. Some shore pines were planted at the Capes during the community's development, and others have sprouted naturally. Over time, these trees proliferated and grew naturally throughout The Capes' properties. The HOA does not require their removal but expects all owners to prune the trees, <u>no less frequently than annually</u>, to a level that maintains the protected views of other neighbors, regardless of whether a lot owner intentionally planted the shore pine or grew spontaneously on any property.

Landscaping between homes is limited to a maximum height of 10 feet. The planting of trees, which are not on this list, is not permitted. Please select dwarf tree and shrub varieties that are less likely to block views at maturity. To reduce the likelihood of landscaping violations, please keep all landscaping low and replace and remove overgrown trees and shrubs. Select the right plant for the right spot, and use a remove-and-replace strategy to maintain views while creating an attractive landscape.

The HOA highly encourages all owners to perform annual pruning and candling of conifers in early May to maintain the protected views of other lot owners. Each Spring and Fall, the HOA hosts landscape cleanup events to help owners complete their pruning. A guideline entitled the <u>Care and Pruning of Shore Pines</u> is available on the Landscape Commitee page. Please remove and replace any tree has grown too large for the protected view.

The Capes Landscape Committee requests that all owners maintain views of the ocean and bay. Many lots enjoy protected views over the roofs of homes and between homes. In some cases, the lots have protected views over the landscaping in front of homes. If you are unsure if your landscaping is blocking the bay and ocean views of other owners, please contact the Landscape Committee for guidance.
